Of course, the garden is as popular as ever and on discovering an old canoe behind the tree the children were really excited to climb inside and adventure to different places.

## What's been happening in school?



### Remember, remember 5<sup>th</sup> November!

We wanted to make a special effort to celebrate bonfire night this year. Whilst the organised bonfires couldn't go ahead, we were in a lucky position to be able to gather the children together to do something special. In fact we had a fire on Thursday and on Friday so that more children could join in.

This was a chance to 'feed the fire' but also feed ourselves too after toasting marshmallows ( thanks to Deb for remembering to get vegan ones!)

Class 2 were asked to help measure the ingredients for Lorna's traditional family bonfire toffee. Because it has been passed down from her parents it was in pounds and ounces so this meant a bit of a maths lesson!





Class 2 decided to use this opportunity to develop their history skills thanks to resident historian Chris. The children had learnt all about a warning letter written to Lord Montecagle, considered primary and secondary sources and taken part in the trial of Guy Fawkes. Chris was then 'volunteered' to double up as Guy Fawkes himself in the re-enactment which was performed to all children outside. Funnily enough no-one else was up for the role once Guy Fawkes had been convicted and they had learnt what happened to him afterwards!

## Celebrating other cultures

Learning about other cultures is incredibly important to us at Dame Catherine's and we are lucky to have several families who can help us with this! This is exactly what we did with Día de los Muertos and Polish Independence Day.

The children in school this Wednesday had quite a treat when 2 of our homeschool children brought in a whole range of foods from Poland. It was fantastic to see so many try and enjoy everything on offer. The strawberry juice drink was scrumptious! Even more importantly, we were able to learn so much from the information which had been researched and prepared at home. Such opportunities are an incredible way to learn about certain difficult times in history for example when Polish people were not allowed to speak openly in their own language. We really appreciate families contributing to our learning in the way.



## Our learning?

Nursery and Class 1 have been embracing the change of season... exploring the outside environment, painting hedgehog pictures and collaging squirrels. They also went on a squirrel hunt and shared poems about Autumn, creating a beautiful display in Class 1.

Fay's group have investigated bubbles and made bubble print paintings. Children have also created their own, individual bubble poems after a group activity listing descriptive 'bubble' words.

Straight after the holiday Fay's group celebrated the South American festival Dia De Los Muertos (depicted in Disney's Coco) by making observational paintings of marigolds and creating 'Papel picado' (a Mexican paper art).



All Early Years children are enjoying taking part in differentiated letters and sounds activities in small groups, supported by some lively songs from BBC's 'Bounce Patrol'.

Fire is a common theme in both Deb and Fay's group. Children spent some of the week of bonfire night listening to firework sounds whilst creating firework pictures. Our youngest children also behaved superbly when there was an impromptu fire drill as a result of Lorna creating rather a lot of smoke when bubbling up the bonfire toffee in the kitchen!

Deb's class have been learning about the Great Fire of London and what London was like in the past. They've been using a story song with sign language to help them. They have also been joining in with some of the Roald Dahl theme of class 2, using the stories of 'George's Marvellous Medicine' and 'The Giraffe, Pelly and Me.'



As for class 2 – where do we start? They certainly have energy and an incredible love for learning. The plan was to have a transition month with a little focus on Roald Dahl. No such thing as 'little' where we are concerned though. The more we learnt the more ideas we had, until suddenly we decided we might as well spend the term linking our ideas to Roald Dahl. So we came up with our big question 'is plotting and planning always marvellous?' which allowed us to throw a multitude of ideas into the mix (like the gunpowder plot, looking at planning buildings and a whole load of fun science investigations.)

The idea of developing a theme park 'Roald Dahl World' has been popular and allowed children to suggest what rides they would like to go on in German, come up with their own ride ideas and suggest where the park should be. The Board of directors and developers are getting close to finalising plans and hope to advertise the park very soon.

Some of the children remembered having used greenscreen last year, so we have made the most of our library space and created quite a few films already this term. These included adverts for their own chocolate bars. They also had a go at creating a shadow puppet play about the Chinese Autumn Moon Festival.

Of course, science always plays a big part in our curriculum. The children have had fun investigating how to make gummi worms wiggle, how to create dream jars like the BFG (learning the meaning of immiscible) and trying to inflate balloons by adding popping candy to soda. They then moved on to investigate luminescence which linked well with Halloween activities, especially making a lantern out of a milk carton. The class 2 cloakroom made an excellent darkroom.





Class 2 are finding ways to carry on doing all of the things we love. They had quite a laugh making their mooncakes in their fetching pink hairnets – it added to the fun.

- A special thank you to Simon Durston-Smith who raised a spectacular £490 when he ran the virtual London Marathon last month around the local area. He managed to run it in just over 3 hours which secured him a place in next year's marathon, which we all hope will be back to normal!
